#### **Distance sampling**

-is a method of estimating population abundance and density of white-tailed deer by counting them at night over a pre-determined area before birthing.







Deer are Cheesequake's largest mammal. It is always a delight when you happen upon a herd in the Park, however a lack of natural predators have let the deer population increase above their normal levels.

Some of the negative effects of too many deer include: increased cases of Lyme disease, automobile accidents, landscape property damage as well as the destruction of the capacity of our forests to produce the next generation of wildflowers, shrubs and trees.

Degraded forests are also impaired in their ability to sequester carbon, absorb rainfall, and offset global warming.

The purpose of this simple fence is to help research deer feeding patterns. This will allow us to decide what impact the deer are having on the Park and what type of population control measures are needed.
