## **Kudzu for Cash??**

Tama Matsuoka of Meadows and More has been adding interest and creativity to dinner plates (and FoHVOS events) through her wild foraging efforts. So when she approached the Strike Team about



a company interested in buying bags of kudzu to investigate the possibility of using it to create a wood finish, we were interested! Mike Bellaus & Brian Kubin collected 30 pounds of it within an hour, creating a net profit for the Strike Team. If interest continues, we'll consider using the sale of kudzu as a 'pre-treatment' to weaken the plants and partially fund the herbicide applications necessary to kill the plants. There

are two dozen populations in New Jersey, some very large, now is the time to dump all of them!

## **Making the Great Swamp Even Greater**

The <u>Great Swamp National</u> <u>Wildlife Refuge</u> is ecological magic. Through effective deer management for decades, it has some of the healthiest forests in the state. Some areas let you know what a primordial forest must have looked and felt like - dense understory of blueberry and winterberry holly with areas filled with mossy hummocks and huge ferns.



Unfortunately, edges of the forest and lands previously plowed for agriculture are under threat from Glossy Buckthorn, a relatively new emerging invasive species discovered by the Strike Team in 2010. For a day, the Strike Team joined forces with John Berry and the exceptionally dedicated volunteers from the Friends of Great Swamp that have been whacking away at this threatening pest. We look forward to continuing partnership to protect this incredible forest.

## **Upcoming Workshop**

The Strike Team has collaborated with Friends of Princeton Open Space and the Princeton Environmental Commission to create a three-hour invasive plant species workshop. Learn about the underlying causes and effects of the invasive species problem, how to identify common and newly emerging invasive species, and track and report invasive species using the NJ Invasive Species Strike Team smartphone app. The workshop is available on two separate dates - October 15 and October 21 - from 1-4 pm both times.
