# Live and Learn

This new 'Live and Learn!' feature will become a staple of monthly Strike Team newsletters. Our goal is to spread newly obtained knowledge provided from Strike Team partners.





The Spotted Lanternfly (*Lycorma delicatula*) is an invasive, non-native insect that was first found in Pennsylvania in 2014. According to a map on the NJ Department of Agriculture's website (map updated on January 2020), this leaf hopper has now spread to multiple states including New Jersey (8 counties), Delaware, Maryland, West Virginia, and Virginia.

In brief, this insect feeds on the sap of woody plants. As the insect feeds, it secretes

honeydew which falls onto adjacent foliage and causes sooty mold (foliage looks blackened). The insect is causing alarm among hops, grape and fruit tree growers, as well as the forestry industry. Homeowners are also concerned for their trees.

Penn State has <u>detailed information</u> about identification and control options for individuals. Possible actions are scraping and destroying egg masses in fall and winter, banding affected trees with adhesive insect traps, and use of a variety of insecticides. There have been reports of beneficial insects and birds trapped in tree bands. Residents within the quarantine areas are required to inspect their vehicles before leaving home. Many business owners traveling in and out of quarantine areas, including farms, delivery services, and others, are required to become SLF permit holders and inspect equipment/vehicles.
